




Faith, culture and life in harmony

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On behalf of the Trustees, it is my great pleasure to present the 2024 Annual Report for the St David's Marist Foundation to you. This report covers the financial year ended 31 December 2024 and includes extracts from the audited Annual Financial Statements.

In this the 18th year since the establishment of the Foundation, I begin this report as always with a reminder of the main object and purpose of the Foundation, as set out in the Foundation's Trust Deed.

The main object of the Foundation is to receive donations from third parties for the purpose of furthering the education objectives and strategic development of St David's Marist School, situated at campuses in both Inanda, Sandton and Alexandra township. The Foundation's main object includes the promotion of the common interests as well as the transformation of the School and ensuring we give young men from previously disadvantaged backgrounds access to the excellence of a St David's education, grounded in its uniquely Marist philosophy and ethos.

As Trustees, we are deeply aware of our responsibility to manage the funds entrusted



to us by our donors in a judicious and prudent manner in line with their wishes. The Foundation looks to balance the commitment to sustainably grow and support the number of young men supported through bursaries with growing the capital base available. Our goal remains to realise annual capital growth in excess of inflation, with a view to making annual bursary awards to the School of between 4% - 6% of the Foundation's opening capital balance at the start of each financial year. This award, combined with donor-specific bursary funding, goes directly to the bursary costs of the identified recipients each year. In addition, donor-specific funding received towards other campus development projects are made to the School during the course of a year.

Through the Foundation's investments in the Centaur BCI Flexible Fund (Centaur Fund) and the Momentum Flexible Investment Fund (Momentum Fund) the underlying asset allocation comprises a diversified and balanced spread of South African listed and offshore equities, preference shares, cash, bonds and property. Approximately 60%

of the Foundation's funds are invested in the Centaur Fund, 30% in the Momentum Fund and the balance in interest-bearing money market deposits.

The year under review

The work of the Foundation continues to be essential to increasing access to a quality Marist education and growing an alumni of future leaders able to tackle the challenges of today and tomorrow, both locally and internationally. The Foundation proudly supported 22 Bursary Scholars in 2024.

St David's satellite campus in Alexandra township opened its doors in January 2023, with a Grade 9 year added in January 2024. Enrolment at the start of 2025 stands at 101, with the development and interest in the campus continuing to exceed expectations. The Alexandra campus is core to the future role that St David's believes it must play in advancing the educational interests in the country. It provides an innovative and scalable model to exponentially increase access to quality education, within a short travelling distance of communities' homes.

Through the generosity of our donors, the Foundation again built on the successful fund raising efforts in 2023 to receive its highest annual donor income, and making its largest annual award to date to the School during the 2024 financial year.

In reviewing the Foundation's activities for 2024 the following is worth mentioning:

- 22 young men were supported on bursaries in 2024 (2023: 24). Of these, five bursaries included the costs of boarding at St David's;
- the Foundation's fund-raising efforts raised a total of R13 510 575 (2023: R6 418 785).
 The Foundation's cumulative efforts over the 17 year period since founding to date have resulted in donations received of R52 591 718 (2023: R39 081 143);
- awards paid to the School amounted to R9 796 564 (2023: R8 039 884). This takes cumulative awards paid to the School over the 17 year period to R43 984 367 (2023: R34 187 803);
- the Foundation's capital, after expenses and awards to the School, increased by 25,58% to R50 615 306 (2023: R40 302 905) as at 31 December 2024;



- eight of the Foundation-funded bursary scholars matriculated at the end of 2024, achieving exceptional matric results; and
- the Foundation's cumulative income since inception amounted to R99 293 512 (2023: R77 780 804).

St David's first-ever Giving Day took place on 31 October 2024 raising R5.4 million towards the upgrade to the Prep and College Academic Wings and Science Labs, the St David's Bursary Fund and the St David's Discretionary Fund. In addition, supporting the further development of the School, the Foundation's philanthropic activities assisted in raising funding towards the installation of the St David's Memorial Pipe Organ. The commencement of the installation of the Pipe Organ in the Chapel of Mary was able to take place during 2024 thanks to the R622 500 generously donated through this campaign.

The Foundation's operational expenditure budget for 2024 amounted to R495 274, including an allocation utilised in support of fund-raising development and related initiatives. The School continues to cover the majority of the operational expenses of the Foundation office, however, the Foundation contributes towards the salary and discretionary running costs on an annual basis. It remains our objective that 100% of donor funding go to the purpose for which it is intended, with operational costs being covered only by either specifically-allocated portions of grants or interest and dividend income.

In July 2024 the Foundation Trustees convened for a Strategy Session and determined that additional capacity for further expansion of the Foundation office should be explored in 2025.

The Foundation continues to work closely with the Old Boys' Association. Our gratitude to the Classes of 1971, 1972 and 2001 who made significant donations towards the development of the Alexandra campus. The official opening of The Maristonian, the home of the St David's Old Boys and gathering place of the St David's community, took place during the week of Champagnat Day in June 2023 and was made possible by R1 100 000 of funds raised through the Maristonian Project Fund held under the Foundation, with further

funding contributed in 2024 towards the Maristonian sound system. We thank the Old Boys for their ongoing philanthropic support.

Looking ahead

We remain steadfast in our goal to build on the achievements of the past eighteen years and further increase the number of young men who are supported on bursaries at St David's, at both the Sandton and Alexandra campuses. For the forthcoming 2024 year, the Trustees have resolved to make an award in the amount of R4 226 184 (2023: R3 582 710) to the School specifically for bursary awards. Including Marist Alexandra Social Compact Programme donor-specific funding of R2 021 500 and further campus project funding received, this commitment in aggregate at the time of this report amounts to R6 912 382.

The Foundation could not exist without the incredible support of our donors. As Trustees, we are humbled by your generosity, partnership and long-term commitment to furthering the Foundation's purpose. I extend our very deep gratitude




for every pledge, donation and bequest made by our donors over the last year - it is a privilege to walk and work alongside you in building hope and a future for our boys.

I would like to also make special mention of the significant contributions made by Lara Klement, the School's Head of Advancement, Fiona Budd, our Foundation Director and Moyagabo Motshekga, our Foundation Office Manager. Their selfless efforts, innovation and persistence resulted in record donations received in 2024, supporting multiple St David's programmes – a magnificent achievement. We thank the Foundation's accountants, Sergio and Vanessa Maraschin, as well as the Foundation's auditor Deidre de Meyer (DME Auditors), supported by Andrea Jordaan, for the professional manner in which they selflessly support these important functions for the Foundation.

To the School's Executive and Board of Governors, the Marist Schools' Council, the Advancement Office, the Marist Old Boys' Association and the rest of St David's Staff, thank you for your continued support of the Foundation, and caring for our boys. I thank my fellow Trustees for the time and resources they dedicate to the Foundation.

The Radical Power of Kindness

Over the past few years at St David's Marist Inanda, our Wellness Department has led several campaigns centred around one simple yet powerful value: kindness. These initiatives got me thinking—why do we need to run campaigns to encourage, and in some cases even teach, something as fundamental as kindness?


While we instinctively understand what kindness feels like, articulating it can be surprisingly nuanced. With a little help (ironically, from AI), here's one thoughtful definition:

"Kindness, at its core, means acting with consideration, care, and compassion for others, often without expecting anything in return. It's a quality of being gentle, helpful, and understanding—prioritizing the well-being of others and showing genuine concern for their needs and feelings."

Initially, I expected that reading more about kindness would lead me to uplifting, "feel-good" stories about humanitarian acts and their emotional impact. And while there is certainly no shortage of those, what truly surprised me was the growing body of scientific research on the subject. Kindness, it turns out, isn't just a virtue—it's also a powerful agent of healing and growth.

The Science of Kindness: A Powerful Panacea

From medical and psychological health to social wellbeing—and even financial resilience—kindness has been shown to offer both preventative and curative benefits.




Medically, acts of kindness stimulate the production of oxytocin, the hormone that reduces blood pressure and supports heart health (Zak, 2005). Kindness also reduces cortisol—the stress hormone—and helps lower inflammation, contributing to improved immune function and reduced risk of chronic illness (Nelson-Coffey et al., 2017).

Psychologically, kindness enhances mood and increases feelings of purpose and connection. Studies show that those who engage in kind acts experience increased self-esteem, reduced anxiety, and lower rates of depression (Post, 2005; Curry et al., 2018).

Socially, kindness strengthens relationships and builds inclusive, cooperative communities. In schools, it creates safer, more trusting environments with less bullying and greater peer support. A 2012 study by Layous et al. found that prompting children to perform kind acts significantly improved peer acceptance and classroom well-being.

Financially, kindness pays long-term dividends. Research from Columbia University shows that for every \$1 invested in social-emotional learning (which includes kindness), there is an average return of \$11 in societal benefits, including improved education outcomes, better health, and reduced crime (Belfield et al., 2015).

In workplaces, cultures built on empathy and gratitude see higher employee engagement and productivity. Kindness, in other words, isn't just good ethics—it's good economics (Grant & Gino, 2010).



A Quiet Force in a Noisy World

In a world increasingly driven by the pursuit of power, status, and financial gain, kindness can feel like a soft whisper in a room full of shouting. But perhaps that's precisely why it matters so much.

Our global systems often reward self-interest over empathy, competition over collaboration, and profit over people.

From politics to business to social media, the loudest voices are frequently those that push dominance, ambition, and accumulation. Kindness, by contrast, seems quiet—almost naïve. And yet, it may be one of the most radical, transformative forces we can offer.

Kindness challenges the belief that value is measured only in material terms. It reminds us that human dignity, connection, and compassion are ends in themselves. While power and wealth often divide, kindness unites. It acknowledges that every person, regardless of background or status, has inherent worth.



In schools like ours, this belief takes on urgent importance. We are not only educating minds—we are forming character. Our students will enter a world that measures worth in metrics, achievements, and margins. But what if we also equipped them with the courage to lead differently? To see kindness not as weakness, but as strength in restraint. Not as passivity, but as deliberate and powerful action in service of others.

Kindness is not incompatible with ambition or success. In fact, the most resilient organisations, strongest communities, and most trusted leaders are those who consistently show empathy and fairness. The business case for kindness is not just theoretical—it's proven.

A Foundation Built on Kindness

Thanks to your support, and kindness, the St David's Marist Foundation continues to support the vison, values and objectives of St David's Marist Inanda and of Marist education more broadly through the work outlined in this report. In its purest form, your support supports (and exemplifies)





our goal of building a culture where kindness is the standard, not the exception. Where generosity is not just a one-time act, but a way of being. Every donation is a statement that compassion matters—and that our values and mission are worth investing in.

Kindness teaches our students that success is not just about what you achieve, but also about what you give back. That how you treat others—especially those with less power—is just as important as how far you climb. This is the kind of world we're trying to shape. And this is the kind of leader we hope each child becomes.

So thank you. For believing in kindness. For investing in a different kind of power. One that uplifts, connects, and transforms—not just students, but communities and ultimately our country and our world.

Building Bridges of Hope and Support

2024 was one for the record books for many areas of St David's, including for the St David's Marist Foundation. Thanks to our donors and partners 1 616 donations totalling R14 087 918, from 957 donors, were made to the St David's Marist Foundation, in support of St David's Marist Inanda. This Annual Report contains a full

list of our treasured donors, partners and supporters – St David's parents, Old Boys, staff, boys, past parents, corporates, private individual donors and local and international foundations and trusts.

Eight Foundation-funded St David's Bursary Scholars matriculated at the end of 2024, achieving exceptional matric results, on top of their already extraordinary College years and achievements at St David's, including St David's Head of School 2024 Fhatuwani Mudau.

A Timeline of Treasure

Below is an overview of some of the happenings, projects and programmes that were supported through philanthropic partnerships and donor funding to and through the Foundation during 2024:

- 22 St David's Bursaries were funded through Foundation general bursary funding and donor-specific funding, including corporates, trusts and private individuals (each bursary is structured according to the requirements identified by the School following a needs assessment)
- St David's Marist Inanda Alexandra corporate, trust and individual donor funding supported further campus development (classrooms and IT requirements), set up and installation of the full IT framework and Social Compact Programme funding to support the education of 61 St David's Marist Alexandra scholars (2024: Grades 8 and 9)
- The St David's Memorial Pipe Organ installation in the Chapel of Mary was made possible through the funding of 21 donors


- The Maristonian: an anonymous donor funded the remaining Maristonian development costs and the Maristonian's sound system was funded through the St David's Arts Circle
- The St David's Aquatics Circle funded pool covers
- The St David's Marist Inanda Alexandra Sciences Lab was funded by Stefanutti Stocks
- St David's Marist Inanda Alexandra
 23-seater minibus was funded by the Loyola
 Foundation USA and the ServeSA Trust
- Our first-ever cryptocurrency donations (two - totalling R2 986 824), in support of the Bursary Fund, were received through the international cryptocurrency philanthropy platform The Giving Block
- During 2024 40 St David's Staff donated on a monthly basis to the Staff Giving Fund, in support of any St David's boy in need
- The School-Days card programme continued – funds raised through the card are split between the St David's PTA and the St David's Marist Foundation Bursary Fund

- The St David's Swop Shop, run by the volunteer St David's Swop Shop Moms, was able to donate R330 000 in proceeds to the St David's Bursary Fund
- St David's first-ever Giving Day took place on Thursday 31 October and Friday 1 November 2024 (a St David's Advancement Office team effort and whole school effort). The three Giving Day funds for support were: Upgrade to the Prep and College North Wing (Academic and Sciences), the St David's Bursary Fund and the St David's Discretionary Fund, with R5 410 564 raised across the three funds. Some of the international donor funds are currently held in the St David's Marist Foundation UK Charity account (just over £5 000) and not included in the Foundation's final 2024 donations tally and recurring monthly donations will also continue into 2025
- Black Coffee's Charity Concert held on Friday 15 November at St David's, in support of the Black Coffee Foundation and the St David's Marist Foundation, raised R300 000 in support of the St David's Bursary Fund.



2024 Award:

The Foundation was able to award a total of R9 797 564 in funding to St David's Marist Inanda during 2024, covering bursaries, capital development and the Marist Alex campus.





2024 Events:

- The Foundation was the first education organisation on the DevMan platform to successfully complete the new IT3d process implemented by SARS in 2024 – this involves uploading all issued Section 18A donor tax certificates to SARS
- Fiona Budd (Director: St David's Marist Foundation) was a contributor to the CFO Q1 2024 magazine's special feature on new strategies for long-term sustainability for South African non profits
- On 5 June Lara Klement (Head: Advancement) and Fiona Budd (Director: St David's Marist Foundation) presented a Masterclass, as part of the International Fundraising Congress Pop-Up conference in Cape Town, on 'School Philanthropy and Fundraising Development – a marathon not a sprint'
- The St David's Marist Foundation's Business, CSI & Philanthropy Breakfast was held on Wednesday 17 July in the Maristonian, attended by 40 guests
- The St David's Marist Foundation Trustees held a Strategy Session on Saturday 27 July in the Maristonian to review the Foundation's strategy and progress and plan the next phase of expansion, with the Foundation having reached 'matriculation' age
- The St David's Marist Foundation 'Gathering of Stars' evening, held on Tuesday 1 October, brought together the St David's Bursary Scholars, the major Bursary Donors, the Foundation Trustees and the School Executive for an evening of connection and celebration













FUNDS AND PROGRAMMES

The Funds of the Foundation

The Foundation can receive both restricted and unrestricted donations. Unrestricted donations are allocated and utilised at the discretion of the Trustees for the purposes that align to the mission and strategic objectives of the School; this provides important flexibility to the Trustees and the School Executive. Restricted donations meet the aims of donors who wish to direct their giving to specific projects or objectives.

A taxpayer making a bona fide donation in cash or kind to the Foundation (an organisation approved in terms of Section 18A of the Income Tax Act 58 of 1962) is entitled to a deduction from their taxable income of the amount donated and the Foundation issues the donor with a tax certificate entitling the donor to claim the donated amount as a deduction (up to 10% of taxable income).



Endowment Fund

The Endowment Fund is an investment Fund set up to provide long-term sustainable support to St David's Marist Inanda, as well as annual liquidity to support Foundation bursaries and projects if required.

Bursary Funds

Father Bernard Brewer SJ Bursary

The Father Bernard Brewer SJ Bursary Fund, named for a previous Chaplain of St David's, is the main Bursary Fund of the Foundation and allows St David's to support deserving boys with potential from previously disadvantaged backgrounds.

The Business in Education B-BBEE Bursary Fund

'Growing tomorrow's business leaders together'

The Business in Education Fund was created to enable corporate and business enterprises to partner with the Foundation through full bursaries to St David's to

realise measurable and quality education intervention programmes for identified learners from historically disadvantaged backgrounds. The introduction of the Revised Broad-Based Black Empowerment Codes of Good Practice created various opportunities through which corporate and business funders can benefit when making contributions to the St David's Marist Foundation. This ring-fenced fund is specifically designed to allow for the separate accounting and reporting process required by the B-BBEE Codes, to give corporate funders maximum scoring benefit in the SED (Socio-economic Development) and SD (Skills Development) categories.

Mizpah Bursary Fund

The Mizpah Bursary Fund ('Mizpah' is a Biblical term meaning 'words of blessing, protection and inspiration') was founded in August 2017 by a Bursary Recipient who matriculated at the end of 2017. His wish in founding the Bursary, with an initial R1 000 that he had raised through his own efforts, is that future boys in need will be



able to have the same opportunities that he received at St David's.

Staff Giving Fund

The Staff Giving Fund, donated to by St David's staff, supports any boy who may be in need at St David's with basic schooling items such as textbooks, uniforms, lunches, school tours, etc, and may also cover items such as proper sports kit, payment for extra-curricular tours, outings, medical treatment (for example, eye tests and glasses, dentistry), etc, where required.

Old Boys' Bursary Fund

The St David's Marist Old Boys' Bursary is awarded by the Marist Old Boys' Association either to the son of an Alumnus or to a candidate identified by the Association, to enable them to continue their St David's education.

Willy & Dorothy Castle Extramural Bursary

The Willy & Dorothy Castle Extramural Bursary, is named in honour of Willy Castle, and his mother Dorothy Castle, and awarded to boys who show promise in the areas of sport or cultural activities, whilst being able to maintain a solid academic standard.

Tertiary Education Bursary Fund

The Tertiary Education Bursary fund provides tertiary bursary support (following the approval of an official approach) for St David's past pupils wishing to pursue a teaching qualification or funding donated by specific donors towards their St David's bursary recipient's tertiary education requirements.

FUNDS AND PROGRAMMES

Family Funds

A Family Fund can be set up under the Foundation in memory of a loved one, in celebration of the blessings you have received as a family, as a family legacy at St David's or to make a difference in the life of a boy who would otherwise not have had the opportunity to attend St David's. Multiple family members and friends can contribute directly to the fund and benefit from the tax benefits, without the administrative burden or fiduciary responsibilities involved in establishing an independent family trust.

Project, Facilities and Development Funds

The Foundation works with donors on funding support for St David's identified areas of development of the School facilities on both campuses, to enhance and support curriculum activities and enable students to experience an education at the highest level.

Capital and Campus Development Fund

Provides funding support for identified areas of development of the School's campus facilities, to enhance and support curriculum and extra-curriculum activities.

Cultural Development

Provides funding support for identified St David's programmes and projects to assist in developing and growing the cultural activity potential and ability of students to the highest level.

Provides funding support for identified St David's programmes and projects to assist in developing and growing the sporting potential and ability of students to the highest level.

Maristonian Project Fund

The St David's Marist Foundation administered the receipt of funds and donations towards the St David's Old Boys' Association's Maristonian Project – a project which was realised in 2023/2024 with the establishment and development of a home base for the Old Boys' Association – the Maristonian.





St David's Marist Alexandra Project Fund

The St David's Marist Alexandra Project Fund was established in 2022 to support the phased building renovation and development of the new St David's Marist Alexandra satellite campus, which opened in January 2023.

St David's Marist Alexandra Social Compact Fund

The Social Compact model and programme is a three-way partnership between St David's (resources), corporate and individual donors (philanthropic funding) and the St David's Marist Alex parents (fees), with each party contributing one third of the total value of the St David's Marist Alexandra annual education cost.

Br Jude Pieterse Marist Alexandra Bursary Fund

To honour the legacy of Br Jude Pieterse, founding Trustee of the St David's Marist Foundation, who passed away on 12 December 2022, this bursary was established to support scholars attending the St David's Marist Inanda Alexandra satellite campus in Alexandra.

St David's Green Development Fund

This Fund supports environmental sustainability projects on the St David's campuses.

The St David's Marist Foundation UK Charity was established in 2009, as the UK Chapter of the St David's Marist Foundation.

In 2010, official registration with the UK Charities Commission was concluded, allowing the St David's Marist Foundation UK Charity to operate as an official charity and in 2018 the Trust's Gift Aid registration with HMRC was finalised, to take advantage of the various tax incentives applicable for donors under UK law. The UK Trustees continue to be committed to establishing a successful and vibrant UK chapter which will focus on strengthening the ties between the Marist diaspora, their South African 'brothers' and the Foundation.

The UK Old Boys' Fund supports the endeavours of the Foundation by raising funds to support bursaries, scholarships and projects as identified by the St David's Marist Foundation UK Charity Trustees.

St David's Giving Day 2024 UK support

During 2024 the St David's Marist Foundation UK Charity was the recipient and conduit of donations from UK-based Old Boys, past parents, past staff and friends of St David's, as part of St David's first-ever Giving Day. The UK Old Boys provided wonderful support in rallying international support for this very special 'first' for St David's, which raised a collective R5.4 million towards the upgrade to the Prep and College North Academic Wing, the St David's Bursary Fund and the St David's Discretionary Fund.

A Campus of Hope and Restoration



2024 - the second year of the St David's Marist Inanda Alexandra campus - saw the addition of a new Grade to the campus (Grade 9) and the enrolment of 61 boys across Grades 8 and 9.

This fledgling campus, embodying the broader vision of St David's Marist Inanda to create a new education model, feels as though it has been part of St David's for much longer than two years. Perhaps it is because this campus was always meant to exist and has only been lying dormant like a seed buried beneath the soil until the right conditions existed for it to break ground, grow and flourish once again.

As with any new model and vision there have been challenges, but we knew when we started that through these challenges, we would find innovative ways to solve problems, and that in finding solutions and new ways of doing things that we would be creating and crystallising a new educational model and blueprint that can be scaled over time and that others can replicate. Our ideals in creating this model remain to accelerate access to quality education in support of not only our own mission as a Marist school, but in support of the UN Sustainable Development Goals, in particular SDG4, and the National Development Plan 2030.



61 boys on campus tripled the number of scholars from the founding year of the campus in 2023, offering the first step in testing our ability to scale the model effectively. It has been wonderful to have a fuller campus, with the sounds and activities of the boys filling the classrooms and corridors. The Grade 9 Pioneer group (or OGs - Original Gentlemen, as they like to refer to themselves) ably stepped up to set the tone and standard for the new boys coming in.

A Social Compact in Education – a new funding model

We knew that to achieve the vision of the St David's Marist Inanda Alexandra campus would require a new funding model – a three-way partnership between the Marist Alex parents (fees), St David's and donors and funders. We have been humbled by the positive response we have received from donors to this new funding model, and how they have understood and insightfully reviewed their funding strategies to allow for support for this new education model.

Donor funding to the Social Compact Programme has allowed us to offer the level of education to the boys on our Alex Campus that is on par with the education on our Sandton Campus, through the sharing of teachers and resources across the campuses and allowing the Alex Campus boys access to the sporting and cultural offerings and facilities, as well as attending key social and educational events on the Sandton Campus. As we continue to develop the sporting and cultural facilities and offering on the Alex Campus, the boys will benefit even further in these core areas.

Academic and Extracurricular Programme

We anticipated that our biggest challenge (but also our reason for undertaking this initiative), once we had opened our doors, would be on the academic front, with many of our boys on the Alex Campus coming from under-resourced primary schools and having large academic gaps in their learning. Boys also have to deal with a number of social issues prevalent in under resourced and financially disadvantaged communities that will inevitably affect their school performance. In light of this, we have been delighted with some of the results that the Grade 8 and 9 boys have achieved, including the following in Term 3 2024:

- A Grade 9 learner in the Top 10 academically across both campuses (164 boys)
- · Isizulu Olympiad

Gold Awards (+80%):

4 boys in Grade 8

1 boy in Grade 9

Diamond Award (above 90%)

1 boy in Grade 8

(93%, Placed in the top 15 nationally)

1 boy in Grade 9

- An increasing number of excellent results in standardised and group tests in both Grades.
- A consistent increase in Grade averages from Grade 8 to Grade 9, with a 54% average in English for Grade 9 - a positive indication of an upward trajectory, and a 3% improvement even from the 1st Term to the 3rd. This is a good reflection of the work that teachers have put in to drive these boys to start applying themselves with greater precision, and the boys' responding to the expectations placed upon them.

As can be expected, it takes time for the boys to adapt to the increased expectations in all areas. It is an ongoing priority to acclimatise the boys to the Marist ethos and culture of excellence, and to offer the support needed to fill learning gaps, teach the necessary learning and life skills, and build the boys' confidence and belief in their ability to achieve their potential.

One of the most important skills required for academic success is that of comprehension of English, which affects almost all aspects of academic learning and even social interactions, and this is an area that has needed focused intervention. The following was put in place this year to address this and other learning and social issues:

- Reading has been prioritised and the appointment of a Reading Specialist has already had an impact.
- Academic enrichment and support has been put in place after extensive discussions.
- Our Wellness Department (including psychologists and a social worker) have added further support.
- External educational psychologists and therapists have been consulted and boys referred for various testing.
- A more structured tutor system has been put in place on the Alexandra campus to offer all the boys, especially those struggling academically, more support and guidance.

- A separate venue for examination and test support was in place for the final standardised tests and exams and will continue for all such assessments.
- Engagement and workshops with parents to ensure that they too understand the expectations and their role and involvement in assisting their boys achieve their potential. Parents are encouraged to play an active role, and to engage with the school if there are queries, concerns or suggestions. Our Social Compact Model requires not only that parents pay fees, but that they have an empowered voice in this relationship. Our Wellness Department continues to add support for parents in this regard.

Sport can be both a social leveller and a great strengthener of social cohesion - something seen so powerfully once again



during the most recent Rugby World Cup. The Alex Campus boys have thrown themselves into the extra-curricular programme, with boys playing in teams across the sporting spectrum and taking up key positions in sports teams and cultural group activities. The most heart-warming aspect is how the boys across the two campuses have integrated in these teams and activities, and how the talent of the Alex Campus boys has been embraced and celebrated. Equally, the Alex Campus boys have been motivated and inspired by the talent, commitment and dedication of the older boys who play/ participate at 1st team level, with a number of boys verbalising that their goal is to play in the 'black and gold' (St David's 1st team colours). There is no doubt that talent exists in our Alex Campus boys in abundance, and having the opportunity to participate and thrive under quality coaches, means that many of the barriers to success have been removed and with hard work and determination. the sky is the limit. Boys from the Alex Campus have captained U15D, U14 B and U14 C Rugby

teams, and U14 A, U14 B, U14 C Soccer Teams. One of the boys has been selected for the Gauteng Schools Basketball team which will compete at the National School Sport Championships in December.


Motivational talks have further ignited passion and belief in many boys, which is evident by the attendance at morning and afternoon gym sessions on both campuses, break time games, basic skill practice and the attendance at pre/post season training sessions. A small group of boys have been part of touring teams to out-of-province festivals and tournaments, and the broadness of exposure that these tours bring is an important part of our educational

offering. The funding built into our Social Compact Model and Fund makes these types of experiences and opportunities possible to any boy who is chosen to be part of a touring team.

Swimming and water safety remains a priority. At the beginning of 2024 the St David's Aquatics team undertook an assessment of the Grade 8 boys, identifying that most were not able to swim. The Aquatics team is addressing this through the Learn to Swim programme, with the aim to have all our boys proficient. We look forward to the day when we have all boys from the Alex Campus not only able to

A number of learners are also representing the school in other extra-curricular activities including choir (chamber choir and Gwijo choir) public speaking, and one learner is



already representing the school on the first Chess team. Considering that he is only in Grade 8, we look forward to him captaining a school team at a national tournament in future years.

Boys also received certificates in the 3rd term of 2024 for:

- 1 boy achieved his Confident Kids Speech and Drama Diploma
- 3 boys achieved their Trinity College of London, Grade 4, Communication Skills certificates, all with distinction (above 85%)
- 12 boys achieved their First Aid, Level 1 and Level 2 Certificates, CPR for Adults, Children and Infants

Grade Camps

An important part of our St David's experience is that of Grade camps, particularly the Grade 8 camp at the start of the year and the Grade 9 'Camino', a 10-day journey 'into the mountains' where the boys experience a range of outdoor activities. The intention of the 'Camino' is as much to journey in nature as it is to 'journey into and

with oneself' – for the boys to discover and explore new aspects of themselves, to push

themselves to try new and challenging things and to spend time in quiet reflection without the 'noise' of the city and being constantly connected. Our Grade 9 Alex boys participated in the Camino this year, for many the first time they had camped or adventured outdoors. As with many of the boys (this year and in the past), the boys found the Camino challenging but incredibly fulfilling and enriching.

Our 2025 Grade 8 boys will be also attending the Grade 8 camp at the start of 2025. This camp has a focus on building a sense of belonging in the boys, and plays an important role in introducing the boys to St David's and to each other. It is a chance for boys to make form friendships, and to get to know their Matric leadership group as well as for House Directors to get to know the boys in their Houses.

Cross Campus Initiatives and Community Engagement

Cross-campus initiatives play an important part in building this new educational model and in breaking down social barriers and perceptions. The boys from the Sandton Campus have had numerous opportunities to visit the Alex Campus, both voluntarily for Community Engagement initiatives and for compulsory Grade events, where the full Grades have spent time together in Alex.

Since opening the Alex Campus, St David's, under the leadership of St David's Director of Community Engagement and Outreach, Mr Claudio Marangoni, has been able to increase community engagement initiatives substantially. Each week, boys from both campuses visited the Alexandra old-age home and nursery school, bridging together different generations with play, smiles, and care. 29 weeks of presence has left an imprint on hearts of both the young and old, showing that the simplest act of just being present can bring joy to others. During three days





of holidays, many hands transformed an abandoned room and the kitchen at the preschool into vibrant areas of colour and hope.

St David's also adopted MC Weiler, a primary school in Alex as their Pad Princess partner, delivering 3500 packs of sanitary pads over ten months, every month, and quietly supporting the lives of 230 girls. This initiative is an important one for the boys to understand challenges that girls experience, especially in under-resourced communities and also for the destigmatisation of menstruation amongst boys and men. A St David's Civvies Day funded a further 90 sets of reusable pads for Grade 7 girls—an investment in dignity and their future schooling. The boys also participated in several other community upliftment initiatives, including inter-school events with peers from Kingsmead, Roedean, De La Salle Holy Cross and Marist Brothers Linmeyer. From cleaning rivers, to making soup, to Qrate workshops (a nonprofit focused on edu-liftment through enhancing critical thinking skills), to playing with children at Maria Kloppers, to painting at Lourdes Primary in Soweto, the boys were able to have a significant impact, and engage with societal issues and needs. The boys have also volunteered at and supported various initiatives, including ice-lolly sales at derby days and markets assisting in getting closer to purchasing the industrial washing machine for the Alexandra old-age home. They have also donated towards and packed 3300 bags of soup for vulnerable communities, 80 care packs for

the elderly residents and supporting staff in Alexandra, two tonnes of old clothing for educational toy-making workshops, and 106 pairs of shoes for Sole 2 Sole, amongst several other initiatives.



Our community engagement team welcomed Kingsmead College, Roedean School, De La Salle Holy Cross at our Alexandra Campus for an interschool community service and engagement day. The students prepared soup for a soup kitchen, designed a colour mural and did some planting at the home for the elderly. This 2024 saw a number of developments on the Alex Campus, the two most significant being the installation and coming online of a full IT infrastructure framework to support the educational, administrative and security needs of the campus - funded by Investec Bank Ltd CSI. This has had a major impact in a number of areas, also making remote teaching from the Sandton campus possible where needed and allowing a number of exciting initiatives to take place, including an online exchange with a Marist school in Spain. Access to knowledge and networks through the internet is vital in this digital age, and having stable and uncapped wifi connectivity plays an important role in the both teaching and learning.

The second exciting project was the installation of a state-of-the-art Sciences Laboratory, funded by Stefanutti Stocks. This laboratory has and will continue to make a significant difference to the quality of teaching and learning in the Sciences, allowing boys to have practical, hands-on

experience in both Physical and Natural Sciences - a key indicator of success in these subjects.

The installation of an inverter, solar panels and back-up water tanks has allowed for education to continue relatively uninterrupted this year, and our plan is to become more self-sufficient and 'green' over time. The drilling of a borehole is an option currently being explored.

A few smaller, yet impactful developments included the donation of funding for a minibus (Loyola Foundation USA and ServeSA Trading (Pty) Ltd) which has been incredibly valuable in the transporting of boys between the two Campuses.

The equipping of a small gym and the introduction of a gym programme has been very well received by the boys. The opening of the school tuckshop was perhaps one of the most exciting developments for the boys!

Into the future ...

Of importance has been the appointment of a full time Headmaster on the Alex Campus from 2025, in the person of Mr Lewis Manthata. Lewis is a seasoned academic and educationalist, having worked as a history teacher, and in various leadership positions at St John's College, St Andrew's College Makhanda and most recently as Deputy Head of Student affairs at St David's. We have no doubt that under Lewis' leadership, the boys and staff on The Alex Campus will thrive.

2025 is an exciting milestone year for the Alex Campus, as the Pioneer boys enter Grade 10. This means that boys will have chosen their set subjects that they will take through to Matric. This will be yet another year of growth as three grades across Grade 8 to 10 are navigated, together with an increased number of staff. We are very pleased with the intake for Grade 8 2025, which will take the enrolment to over 100 boys across the three grades.



A number of campus development projects are on the cards for 2025, thanks to our generous donor organisations and individuals. Funding has been committed by DN Invest for an IT Centre, which will be equipped to teach both IT and CAT from Grade 10 upwards, as well as to teach coding, robotics, and IT literacy to the Grade 8s and 9s. This Centre will be instrumental in teaching our boys both basic and advanced skills needed to navigate and thrive in the 21st Century.

Funding has also been committed by Sabvest for further classroom upgrades and by a private funder towards music development. Development of sporting facilities is also currently under discussion.

All of these developments will add significantly to the quality of education and experiences that our boys on the Alex Campus will enjoy. We believe that if our boys and families intrinsically have a sense of selfworth, that this will be the greatest gift that we can give them, as from this will stem all other success and fulfilment.

There are thousands of young people in our country filled with latent potential but no opportunity to realise it. We hold the key, and partnerships like the one between St David's Marist Inanda and organisations, businesses and philanthropic individuals has the potential to unlock the door. We



ST DAVID'S GIVING DAY 2024

St David's first-ever Giving Day was held on Thursday 31 October and Friday 1 November 2024.

We thank our St David's community for coming together so beautifully in support of the St David's Giving Day, and for meeting and exceeding the fundraising target set of R5 000 000!

The purpose in hosting St David's 'Going for Gold' Giving Day, as with all of our philanthropic fundraising initiatives at St David's, was to support the mission, vision and strategic objectives of the School and to impact the lives of the boys (current and future) who attend St David's Marist Inanda across both campuses. The project options for giving were primarily in support of two areas which support St David's strategic objectives as a Marist school of providing both excellence and access: the upgrade of the Prep and College Academic North Wing, including Sciences Labs, and the St David's Bursary Fund, which provides the opportunity for talented youngsters from financially disadvantaged backgrounds



to attend St David's. The third option for support was the St David's Discretionary Fund, for the School to utilize according to need.

Preparations for St David's Giving Day began in March 2024. Undertaking such an initiative for the first time. especially one of this scale, requires buy-in and trust from those within and associated with the School. Having this buy-in, trust and ultimately, the support from the Board of Governors, the Foundation Board of Trustees, the Executives of the Prep and College, the PTA, the Old Boys' Committee and the St David's Marist Foundation UK Charity Trustees was invaluable and sincerely appreciated. Many of the above were actively involved individually too. leading by example through pledges, donations, speaking in the St David's

Giving Day videos and further encouraging St David's community engagement. The Giving Day core team comprised the St David's Advancement Department: Lara Klement (Head: Advancement), Fiona Budd (Director: St David's Marist Foundation) and Moyagabo Motshekga (Foundation Office Manager), Joe Kotwal (St David's Stakeholder Manager: PTA and Old Boys), Carey Fisher-Gietzman (Marketing Liaison) and Jordan Vos (Digital Content Manager).

An important factor in being able to achieve the Giving Day goal was being able to secure half of the ultimate target of R5 000 000 in matched funding before going 'live' on 31 October and 1 November. We are incredibly grateful to our Matched Funders listed at the end of this report for their generous support. This funding allowed us to inspire our broader community to donate on the basis that their donation would be matched, thereby doubling their donation.

Many of our St David's community in key areas, such as the College and Prep House Directors, PTA, Class Moms and Old Boys, took up the challenge of forming Teams, challenging

and inspiring those in their circles and networks to get involved. These team leaders and 'cheerleaders' were invaluable in building up the 'gees' (spirit) and getting the word out. A number of parents and staff also joined us in the Maristonian over the two days, and were amazing in promoting our Giving Day. We are so grateful for all your support! Our Executive Head, Mike Thiel, was placed in Whatsapp 'jail', temporarily for the number of calls and whatsapps he made to rally support for St David's Giving Day!

The Giving Days on 31 October and 1 November were a whirlwind of activity in our Giving Day HQ in the Maristonian, filled over the two days with boys, staff, parents, and Old Boys. Many took a turn on the phones, and it was very sweet observing some of the boys trying to figure out exactly how an 'old school' handset works. The boys took on the task with enthusiasm: the little Mini Marists (who had received prior permission from their parents) bravely phoned mommy, daddy, granny or uncle



words why their family member should donate money to their school was incredibly heartwarming. The Prep boys were a little more confident in their calls, and took it in their stride when mom or dad asked a few more questions before agreeing to donate, and ended their calls with a quick 'thank you, love you". Our College boys from both campuses truly 'took courage' and were the major force in not only contacting their own families but in manning the phones and calling Old Boys and past parents on the St David's database. Speaking proudly and passionately about their school and the Going for Gold initiative, they inspired many to make a donation, big or small, and were very convincing in securing donations for their own House! To watch them cheer in delight when a donation popped up on the screen from someone they had contacted, or when a significant milestone in donations was achieved was tremendously heartwarming.

The support of the St David's staff was key to the success of St David's Giving Day, and we are grateful to every staff member who walked the journey with us, giving advice and helping us to put together a plan-of-action to involve the boys, ensuring the boys were where they needed to be at the correct



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


